# MENTAL HEALTH COURT ELIGIBILITY - MENTAL HEALTH CRITERIA (SMD)

- Schizophrenia
- Schizoaffective Disorder
- Bipolar Disorder
- Major Depressive Disorder, Recurrent
- Post Traumatic Stress Disorder
- Substance Abuse



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# LEGAL CRITERIA

- Competent to Stand Trial
- Have the Cognitive Ability to Understand & Participate in MHPD Program
- Willing to Plead Guilty to the Charge; Guilty Plea Will Be Dismissed If the Defendant Completes the MHPD Successfully

- Soliciting
  - Resisting Arrest

# MHPD Phases

- Phase 1 - Stability & Compliance  
(3 months)
- Phase II - Support and Planning  
(6 months)
- Phase III - Balance and Connecting  
(6 months)
- Phase IV - Maintaining and Citizenship  
(6-9 Months)



# MHPD Goals

- Link with clients within 72 hours of court accepting client into MHPD
- Provide a consistent agency liaison to attend weekly staffing and court meetings.
- Utilize existing programming which includes a system of care that addresses co-occurring disorders and provides crisis and/or on-call support.
- Coordinate with appropriate agencies for housing, employment and medical services.



# ADAP 101

- Charge originates from County Prosecutor as an F4/F5
- Client pleads guilty to M1 and either
  - Pays Fines and Costs
  - Completes 3 day course and attends 'insight' oriented class with proof of attendance
  - Is referred to ADAP OEP or Long-Term
  - Successful completion could result in charge being dismissed.



# ADAP Opiate Extension Program, (OEP)

- ❑ Charge can originate by Franklin County Prosecutor or City of Columbus Prosecutor
- ❑ Possession of Opiate or derivative: (heroin, Percocet, Oxycodone, fake scripts, etc.)
- ❑ Plead guilty to the charge
- ❑ Attend court weekly
- ❑ Participate in an AOD assessment and follow all recommendations of treatment
- ❑ Participate in random urine screens
- ❑ Charge may be dismissed upon successful completion



# ADAP Long-Term

- ❑ Charge originates in Municipal Court
- ❑ Client pleads guilty to the charge
- ❑ Client must complete four phases of programming in order to graduate.
- ❑ 90/90 meetings
- ❑ Participate in any/all counseling recommended through AOD assessment.
- ❑ Receive random urine screens
- ❑ Possible SCRAM bracelet
- ❑ Charge may be dismissed upon successful completion



# 2010 ADAP 101 DATA

- 373 plead guilty/ 343 completed the 3 day course.
- Number receiving new felony charges, 6
- Average number of jail days for same charge in 2009 was 16.6
- Average number of jail days for same charge in 2010 was 3.3.
- Total Costs Savings: \$391,911



# ADAP OEP DATA

- 69 referred
- 5 holding professional licenser
- Number receiving new charges: 16
- Average number of jail nights prior to OEP, 18.5.
- Average number of jail nights while in OEP, 7.9.
- Total costs savings \$56,781
- Total dead from overdose = 4



# 2010 ADAP Long-Term Data

- 93 Referred
- Average number of jail nights prior to ADAP LT, 40.98
- Average number of jail nights while in ADAP LT, 11.4
- Number receiving new charges: less than 1%.
- Total costs savings: \$217,325



# CHANGING ACTIONS TO CHANGE HABITS, CATCH

- History of charges include prostitution, solicitation, theft, drug abuse
- Must be willing to plead guilty to the charge
- Might have to stay in jail until a treatment bed is available
- Given a curfew and a stay away zone
- Program is two years



# WHO IS THE CLIENT?

- 1/3 of women entered prostitution before the age of 15
- 62% of women were deeply involved in prostitution before their 18<sup>th</sup> birthday
- 96% of prostitutes who entered prostitution as juveniles were runaways (this is typically the result of physical and/or sexual abuse occurring in the home)

(Treatment of Prostitute Victims of Sexual Assault: Silbert, Mimi H. 1984)



# What are her current issues?

- Alcohol and/or drug abuse is nearly universal with these women.
- 82% of these women are physically assaulted
- 83% of these women have been raped while working with 27% being assaulted by multiple assailants.
- 35% have sustained broken bones
- 47% have sustained head injuries which are considered Traumatic Brain Injuries, TBIs.
- (*"Violence in Indoor and Outdoor Prostitution Venues"* Deborah L. Shapiro February 2004 )



# MHPD meets CATCH

- 96% of these women are diagnosed with a severe mental illness, including, major depression, bi-polar disorder, schizophrenia and post-traumatic stress disorder.
- And yet while incarcerated studies show that individuals with SMI frequently do not receive adequate psychiatric treatment (Lamberti, 2007)
  - They are not identified
  - Receive only medication treatment while in custody
  - May not follow up with or be connected to ongoing services when released



# 2010 CATCH DATA

- 65 referred
- 35 accepted
- Prior to CATCH average number of arrests per year was 4.7. While in CATCH average number of arrests was less than 1.
- Prior to CATCH average number of jail nights per year was 52.1, (\$144,056) While in CATCH, average number of jail nights was 3.13, (\$8,654)
- Total costs savings per year: \$135,402
